WHAT IS THE DURATION OF THE MPhil SOUTHERN URBANISM PROGRAMME?

The MPhil curriculum combines course work (50%) and a minor dissertation (50%), a full-time load completed over a minimum period of 18 months.

IS THE DEGREE FULL TIME OR PART TIME?

This is a full time course completed over a minimum period of 18 months.

WHAT IS THE LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION?

The language of instruction is English.

CAN I COMPLETE THIS DEGREE REMOTELY?

This degree can not be completed remotely as the teaching methodology relies on small group seminars and city-based experiential and embodied learning.

HOW IS THE COURSE STRUCTURED?

In year one students complete the Masters coursework, which includes a compulsory City Research Studio, a choice of two of three interdisciplinary urban modules, and an urban focused elective.

In year two students write minor dissertations based on their own fieldwork, under the supervision of expert faculty and researchers in either the Humanities, Engineering and the Built Environment, or Science Faculties at the University of Cape Town.

WHAT ARE THE ENTRY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PROGRAMME?

In order to apply for the Masters in Southern Urbanism prospective students need to have completed a four-year Bachelors or a Masters degree.

Students from institutions whose language of instruction is not English may be asked for proof of language proficiency.

Entry to all our postgraduate programmes is competitive. In special circumstances graduates who have shown by examination, or publication, or a record of appropriate training, that they have reached a level equivalent to an Honours degree may be admitted, at the discretion of the Dean of Science. Such cases usually involve research, professional experience or publication that demonstrate competence in an appropriate field, usually considered to encompass approximately five years of experience in a relevant field subsequent to obtaining a first degree in that field.

HOW DO I APPLY?

Please download and complete the following:

- Environmental and Geographical Science departmental application form (you will need to submit all the documents listed on the form)
- MPhil Reference form: please ask two academic or professional referees to fill this form and send it directly to pgapplications.egs@uct.ac.za

Once completed, submit these documents in one single pdf (except for the Reference forms emailed by your referees directly) to pgapplications.egs@uct.ac.za

Please make sure that you apply to the Faculty of Science via UCT's online system too.

DEADLINE FOR SA & INTERNATIONAL CANDIDATES:

31 August 2021

You should receive confirmation of submission immediately. Within three working days, you will receive formal acknowledgment of your application, containing your applicant number and login credentials to UCT's online student self-service called PeopleSoft. Log in to PeopleSoft to monitor the status of your application.

It is important to note that acknowledgment of your application does not mean you have been accepted and admitted to UCT.

Consideration of your application may take up to a couple of months or more. You may be asked to submit further information and/or documentation.

Communication about your application will reach you by email at the UCT email address assigned to you at the time of first application.

ONCE I HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED, WHEN DO I REGISTER?

Generally registration takes place at the start of the academic year; for certain research-only postgraduate degrees you may register later. The process and dates for your programme registration will be sent at the time of acceptance/ admission but do check for updates on faculty or programme websites.

NOTE: You are not officially a UCT postgraduate student (with access to the required facilities and resources, including supervision) unless registered.

International Postgraduates (including from SADC countries) must report to the International Academic Programmes Office (IAPO) for pre-registration clearance. This includes fee clearance, presenting your study permit and health insurance information. Your registration at the faculty will only be processed once you have been cleared by IAPO.

IS THERE FUNDING OR BURSARIES AVAILABLE FOR THIS PROGRAMME?

We have a limited number of bursaries available for South African and international students respectively. Successful local applicants will be advised on their application to National Research Foundation (NRF) bursaries following the decision of the MPhil in Southern Urbanism selection committee two weeks after the application deadline. All international applicants are considered for our Mellon bursaries by virtue of applying to the programme, a separate bursary application is not required.

All applicants are encouraged to seek additional funding, as the number of the programme's own bursaries is limited and the selection process is therefore competitive. Please regularly check the [Postgraduate Funding Office's website](#) for current funding opportunities.

WHERE CAN I FIND ACCOMMODATION AT UCT?

UCT can offer on-campus accommodation to just over 600 postgraduates, so space is limited. If you are looking for on-campus accommodation, apply early. You will not be considered for on-campus accommodation unless you apply.

The allocated bed space for postgraduate students is proportionally divided between the faculties. Each faculty has a set number of housing places for the year, and placement is dependent on individual faculty rules. Some residences provide for the needs of students with physical disabilities.

Third-tier residences offer semi-autonomous self-catering accommodation. They have wardens who oversee the academic and social well-being of the students in the sector. The wardens ensure that there is a good community life in the houses, flats and the purpose-built residences like Obz Square. Since there are limited places in UCT residences, many postgraduate students find their own accommodation in private housing off campus.

If you wish to join one of UCT's student accommodations, you are strongly encouraged to apply early. For all information regarding student accommodation, please contact the accommodation office. Note that the course convener will not be able to assist you regarding housing issues.
